



Resiliency is a word that has made its way into my orbit a lot recently. I always feel challenged to come up with different superlatives that are befitting our Roxy™ Therapy Dogs volunteers and the organization at large. Tasked with trying to think of a word that best describes our volunteers for 2020, I am once again drawn back to resilient. In March 2020, our work as we know it came to a grinding halt. Suddenly we found ourselves unable to physically support and comfort the children in our community at a time when they needed us the most. Our volunteers did not take this as a defeat but more so as a challenge.

The first thing our volunteers did was launch our "**Roxy™ Reads**" program. (Page 17) We typically listen to students read to us during school visits so we enjoyed reading to them for a change.

We held a **Roxy Pup Portrait Contest** for students to enter by drawing photos of their favorite dog as well as a **Roxy Pup Poem Contest** for students who chose to write about their favorite instead. (Page 18 and 21)

Our very first **Roxy Certificate of Excellence** lecture series, Insights Into the Child With Autism was scheduled for March but with a lot of creativity and hard work, our volunteers figured out how to put together an amazing, successful *virtual* lecture. (Page 30)

In the fall, school was still virtual so we created "**Roxy on Demand.**" Teams also visited classes virtually when possible, but these videos were extremely helpful for teachers when visits were suspended. (Page 19)

Our accomplishments were great in number and deed in 2020, but, we did not reach them alone. Every person who donated to Roxy Therapy Dogs and supported our organization was right there with us every step of the way. You helped us purchase a Zoom membership so that we could still hold meetings and conduct business. You helped us cover the cost of editing the recordings from our virtual lectures so that they would be available for participants to reference. You enabled us to provide our young contest winners with Roxy prizes! :)

Your donations allowed us to stay connected to the children in our community even though we could not be with them in person. **You** helped us make meaningful connections and continue with our mission. At a time when many people had to cut back on supporting nonprofits, you still believed in us enough to generously donate.


One thing I know for sure, is that the resilience of our volunteers is immeasurable, and with the support of our community, we can achieve anything.

Roxy reached a number of milestones during 2020, although not exactly as planned at the beginning of the year, pre-covid. But when the schools, the courthouse, and medical facilities closed to outside visitors, our amazingly resilient volunteers and their Roxy dogs found multiple new and creative ways to stay connected during a very stressful period for children, parents, and teachers, alike.

In 2020, we held Roxy's first Certificate of Excellence workshop. For two years, Roxy volunteers have worked to create a professional level series of advanced educational workshops for canine therapy teams. The first was scheduled to launch in March 2020 at Delaware Valley University. Rather than cancel, Roxy adapted the format

and *Insights into the Child with Autism* took place in July 2020 within a Zoom environment. The response from attendees was overwhelmingly positive but the biggest winner will be the kids on the autism spectrum in Central Bucks.

2020 also proved to be the best financial year Roxy Therapy Dogs has had, to date. Not only did this help us continue our mission to inspire, help educate, and comfort children wherever we're needed, but it showed us that the community values our long volunteer hours of work and strongly supports our mission. n a normal year, before the pandemic, Roxy Therapy Dogs would touch thousands of lives. Our mission would be carried out in the schools of the Central Bucks School system, in medical facilities and in court facilities across the county. Our ability to carry out that mission is dependent upon donations. While Roxy as an organization is always searching for public funding, the fact remains we are dependent upon donations from individuals like you.

...what can be more important than helping kids.

So why should you donate to Roxy? Or rather, why should you encourage others to donate to Roxy? As Chairman of the Board, I'd like to take this opportunity to tell you why.

The work done by our therapy dog teams in the schools, medical facilities and court facilities is tangible. There is no end to the need. Children will always need to learn to read, people will always get sick and unfortunately, human nature indicates society will always require legal proceedings. For Roxy's mission to continue


indefinitely, we need funding. Moreover, Roxy is always seeking to increase involvement and improve the performance of our teams through deeper understanding and education. The development and production of the Certificate of Excellence Program requires funding. Children in other communities need therapy dogs too. Because we know the program works here in our community, we know it will work in other communities as well so we make

concerted efforts to spread the message and support new

organizations with information about what works for us.

Finally, awareness is key to impact. Knowledge of the availability of our qualified and certified teams to provide comfort and support in a myriad of situations is critical to our community involvement. 







2020 Financials

2020 Expenses by Category







5 Programs To Comfort And Support Children



Most people know Roxy Therapy Dogs for our flagship program – Elementary School Reading Inspiration. Before COVID-19, our teams supported 3,200 children each week in the Central Bucks School District.

Roxy has four additional programs that support and comfort children in our area from the youngest to the oldest, from the classroom to the courtroom.



1. Elementary School Reading Inspiration



Roxy's flagship program gives young readers a chance to read aloud to a furry friend in small groups or one-on-one on a weekly basis. Dogs don't judge or correct, but serve as a calming influence, building students' confidence, improving reading skills, and fostering a love of reading.

2. Student Specialized Support



Students in Autistic, Multiple Disability, Life Skills, Learning Support, and Emotional Support classes benefit from regular Roxy visits that help them maintain a sense of calm, well being and an openness to stimuli and learning while also increasing social competence and developing a sense of empathy.

3. Secondary School Stress Relief



High school students struggling with stress and anxiety benefit from the much-needed support and compassion provided by Roxy visits as part of Stress Management classes, organized support groups, and during exam times.

4. Courthouse Companionship



At the Bucks County Courthouse, Roxy therapy dogs comfort children navigating Dependency Court or who are victims of violent crime. Able to relax and remain calm with a dog by their side, children await their appointment to appear before a judge. On occasion, dogs are invited into the courtroom.

5. Pediatric Comfort



Roxy teams bring joy to children in hospital and healthcare settings. Roxy visits calm their fears, give them a break from medical procedures, and ultimately speed the healing process.



Impact Statements

Roxy's certified therapy dogs deliver self-esteem, relief from anxiety and fear, and a sense of well-being.

To a child who feels safe and relaxed, learning is accessible, and physical and emotional healing are accelerated.



Dear Mrs. Fleck,



I love that Maggie found a way for Chloe and Trixie to stay connected to the students so they can continue to grow their love of reading.


Pup Portraits Contest



hloe, a 9-year-old yellow lab, and Trixie, a 4-year-old chocolate labradoodle, have been visiting Mrs. Coyle's Learning Support Class at Linden Elementary since 2017. Chloe and Trixie visit on alternate weeks. After entering the classroom, we are escorted to an amazing children's library created by Mrs.

This idyllic setting makes it so easy for the dogs to snuggle up to the kids while they read. Along with snuggling up beside them, each dog has its own special way of interacting. Chloe likes to vocalize and sometimes it sounds like she's talking. Once, a child insisted she said, "Hi Kevin!" Trixie is famous for giving kids a

expected we would still be shut down almost a year later. Yet here we are in our new normal. Our in-school visits had been a weekly highlight and the dogs and I missed that routine. When I asked Mrs. Coyle if she would like to try a virtual visit she jumped at the chance. Wonderful I thought! Then I wondered how in the world am I going to get my dogs to a video conference?! What did I get myself into?

So, we set up a time, Monday at 11, and agreed to just see what happens. I decided both dogs would be comfortable on their big bed together

in the family room. I set up the computer there. Around 10:45am I got out their Roxy Therapy Dog bandanas. I only wish I had thought to video their reactions. Talk about a happy dance! They both wagged their tails furiously.

Gingerbread Man between them. So far so good!

I clicked on the video link and just like that we were video conferencing with Mrs. Coyle's

Trixie started turning in circles. Chloe started vocalizing. Kevin might have guessed that she said, "school, school!"

Once they donned their bandanas, their therapy dog training kicked right in. They looked to me for direction. I asked them to lie together in their bed. I propped up Lamb Chop and the

class. You might ask how I got them to look right at the kids when they read? Chicken jerky behind the camera, of course! And, yes, they very obediently stayed right there long enough for all 5 kids to read a book to them. Trixie gave them all virtual high-fives. Such good dogs!

Mrs. Coyle said the kids talked about the dogs

throughout the day after our first visit. I was so happy to know that we were back in the classroom again even in this small way.

Each week the kids are anxious to see the dogs on their computer screen as they adjust to their “new normal.” They sit in front of their



computer camera in their sweet little masks and show us the title of the book they are going to read. We usually get to chat a minute before they begin. Is that a Linden Leopard mask you’re wearing? Did you build a snowman on your snow day? They want to know if Trixie will give a high-five before or after reading (both!). Sometimes it’s an awkward situation. Voices in masks are muffled and sometimes hard to hear. It’s hard for a kid to ask for help with a word remotely.

I’m not there to read along. Eye contact and body language are difficult to read from a computer screen. Yet they bravely soldier on with a big smile behind their little masks, doing their best like the rest of us in this terrible pandemic. When they are done reading, they proudly proclaim, “THE END!” and wait for Trixie’s high-five. And, naturally, I tell them what great readers they are and how much Chloe and Trixie enjoyed the book. They wave good-bye and we say, “see you next week!”

These 1st and 3rd graders are so adaptable and I find that inspirational. Of course, these fun and happy virtual visits are only possible because of our incredible teacher, Sarah Coyle. She and her aides, Annette Boylan and Rose Sinclair, have taught in school five days a week throughout this pandemic. They continually look for ways to adapt to the “new normal.” Sadly, the library had to be dismantled. No books or cushions allowed. It’s stored in Mrs. Boylan’s basement. Yet, despite the many restrictions and difficulties, they remain cheerful and positive role models for the kids in their class every day. I must believe that these brave, dedicated women will have a special place in the hearts of their students, especially when they look back at this time as adults. I know they have a special place in my heart and we can’t wait to get back into the classroom with them. They are my Pandemic Heroes!

In Denise's Words

Obi hadn't been to the courthouse for his monthly Children and Youth Services visits since March when we were shut down due to the pandemic. When Melissa asked for a volunteer to meet with Judge Yeager I knew Obi would love to go – he is one of those guys who loves a job and the last months had ended his Gayman school visits as well.

I walked him around the courthouse a few days ahead of our scheduled meeting just to give him a little refresher.

Obi was all business once we arrived. Greeting everyone with gentle head wrap on their thigh –



for a soft pat. I think folks were happy to have a dog back in the courthouse.

He sat right next to the little 8-year-old girl at the big conference table, putting his head on her lap every now and then. She easily answered the judge's questions while always having a hand on Obi somewhere. We could see that having him there was comforting for her. Obi stayed there for the full 2-hour session – the Judge kindly asked if Obi was OK to stay and he was – just happy to do his job.

We shared a fluffy puppy and a coloring book and crayons with the child, and when the conference was over we delivered her back to her Mom. Obi was presented with a squeaky stuffed candy cane toy from the little girl – a big hug and kiss and a quick photoshoot by Mom.

I can't describe how happy and heartwarming this Roxy experience was – it is so gratifying to provide this kind of support to children.

After two years in the making, Roxy was excited to successfully launch our Certificate of Excellence program (COE) in July 2020. The goal of the COE program is to provide continuing education on specific topics relevant to therapy dog teams so that teams will gain a better understanding and more confidence when working with all types of children in our community. Postponed from March, our first series, *Insights Into the Child With Autism*, was virtual with lectures via Zoom.

But Wait! Renee found another use for the Roxy Bandana!





NO PAID EMPLOYEES

Roxy Therapy Dogs is an all-volunteer organization. For 15 years, Roxy has relied on volunteers to provide their own certified therapy dogs to help children, serve as executives, board members, advisors, administrative staff, program directors, committee members, and event organizers, etc. The list is long.

Even without paid staff, Roxy strives to function like a best practices non-profit with paid staff to ensure that therapy dog services are delivered to children in our community in the best way possible.



THERE ARE NO FEES FOR OUR SERVICES

One of the reasons we need donations and support from the community is that Roxy does not receive any payment from our venues. The Central Bucks School District, the Bucks County Courthouse, Doylestown Hospital, and Pedia Manor enjoy the benefits of our certified therapy dog teams free of charge. The demand grows each year.



DONATIONS ALLOW US TO CONTINUE OUR WORK

Your support ensures that Roxy can continue its mission. Your donation covers recruiting new therapy teams, administrative expenses, insurance expense, communications, website maintenance, electronic newsletters, professional services, and fees for special events so that we can share Roxy Dogs with everyone in the community.



ADVANCED EDUCATION IS OUR FUTURE

After two years of research and planning, Roxy launched the Certificate of Excellence Series and we need your support. Advanced therapy skills for specific situations like autism, advanced trauma, anxiety, and more, will strengthen the organization and enhance the experience for children, their families, dogs and volunteers. It will also help Roxy to continue its mission into the future.

Advancement Highlights

ONCE AGAIN IN 2020, the Advancement Committee, with the help of Marketing and all of you, ran a successful Annual Appeal. We raised a total of \$12,710. A sincere thank you to everyone who supported us.

Another critical fundraising effort for the Advancement team was, and is, to support the new Certificate of Excellence (COE) program, our educational initiative to provide advanced training for our teams and the general public in understanding the children we visit with autism,

trauma issues, and more. We have worked hard at successfully applying for grants to fund this program. The Foundations Community Partnership provided Roxy

with \$7,500 in late 2019 for the new COE Video Library which commenced in 2020. An additional \$5,000 was given by the Haley Foundation to help fund the COE program, generally. We also received \$5,000 from the Bucks County Foundation to help meet general operating and program expenses in 2020, \$5,000 from Future Stars Day Camps, and \$1,250 from Citizens Bank, Wealth Management Division, among others.

We are pleased to report that the total raised in 2020 to support Roxy was \$40,326 (a 20.8% increase over 2019).

Your support helps us ensure that Roxy Therapy Dogs remains an organization that meets the demand in the Central Bucks community to bring comfort to children, to enhance the experience of learning, and to enrich the lives of our human and canine volunteers.




